Uganda records significant decline in maternal death rate



YOU have helped to make this happen

The Uganda Bureau of Statistics is reporting a significant decline in maternal and infant mortality rates. Uganda has made great strides in maternal health, according to a report released this month, with the maternal mortality rate decreasing from 438 deaths per 100,000 live births (registered in 2011) to 336 deaths per 100,000 live births.

It is very good, deeply satisfying news for all of us at Save the Mothers--but especially for founder and executive director Dr. Jean Chamberlain Froese. Next month, Dr. Jean and her family say "good-bye" to their Ugandan home, and re-establish a full-time home in Canada. They leave behind 12 years of work in East Africa, but their commitment to the mission of Save the Mothers will continue, through Dr. Jean's advocacy and strategic oversight.

The statistics represent this truth: **thousands of lives have been saved.** And YOU have helped that to happen. With hearts full of gratitude, we thank you.
